That's a **BIG** Rock!

Thanks to Plymouth County Secondary Roads and Stockton Towing, we have a 37,000 lb. Sioux Quartzite boulder gracing our new playground! The large metamorphic rock was found by the Plymouth County Secondary Roads Department while working on a road project north of LeMars.



Sioux Quartzite is only found near the intersection of South Dakota, Iowa, and Minnesota. Formed 2280-110 million years ago during the Proterozoic Eon.

This metamorphic rock is the same rock found at Falls Park in Sioux Falls.



Now an extremely erosion resistant rock, Sioux Quartzite was formed from highly erodible sandstone. Sandstone, which is a sedimentary rock, formed in shallow rivers that ran southeast throughout the region.

Today there are buildings in this region, still standing, that are made from this stone, a good choice due to its stable nature.

Tubing Hill

What a Great Tagging Year

At the beginning of September every year, we get to witness a grand migration. For the past 12 years, Plymouth County students have had a chance to collect scientific data and submit it to a nationwide database on these amazing migrators. With nets in hand and eyes wide, students rove through the prairies searching for the magical monarch butterfly.

Once caught the butterflies are tagged with a small (paper punch sized) sticker on their hind wing. The sticker contains contact information and an identification number. The tag information and sex of the insect as well as date and location are recorded and submitted to the Monarch Watch database. This year 203 butterflies were tagged on field trips and for

in-class lessons.



Now we wait. These monarchs have started to arrive at their overwintering grounds in Mexico. If one is found and reported to Monarch Watch, their tag information will be entered into the database, where taggers can search for their butterflies. In past years we have had 8 recovered but we have never sent in so many records. We should find out this spring if any of our butterflies were recovered.

CODE OF CONDUCT PLYMOUTH COUNTY CONSERVATION PROGRAM DISCIPLINE AND DISMISSAL POLICY

Plymouth County is interested in the welfare of all adults and children. Participants in Plymouth County Conservation programs are expected to follow the rules of the program and obey the direction of staff, whether paid or volunteer, and other adults in supervisory positions. A participant's failure and inability to follow rules and obey directions may cause a serious discipline problem. A serious discipline problem may also occur when a child hampers the smooth flow of the program by requiring constant one-on-one attention, inflicts physical or emotional harm on other children, abuses staff and adults, or is otherwise unable to conform to the rules and guidelines of the program. Kicking, biting, abusive behavior towards others, name-calling, unwanted displays of affection, and inappropriate language are examples of such unacceptable behavior.

An adult causing problems or disruptions will be reminded of the rules, then asked to leave if the problem continues.

All summer program registrants are expected to follow the rules of the program and obey the direction of the summer program leaders and other adults in supervisory positions. When a child's behavior creates a discipline problem as described in the above Discipline and Dismissal Policy, the following procedures shall be followed:

- 1. The child shall be separated from the problem activity or situation. Staff shall help the child rejoin the group when they are ready.
- 2. Staff shall listen to the child and discuss the consequences of further misbehavior.
- 3. Repeated misbehavior shall be handled through conversations with a parent.
- 4. The parent, child, and staff shall agree to a plan that improves behavior.
- 5. If improvement does not occur or a solution cannot be determined, staff may recommend that the child be dismissed from the program.

Emergency Release

NOTE: Acceptance into a program is conditioned on the above policy and the right to dismiss a participant from the program as outlined above. Your cooperation in making your child's experience the best possible, is needed. Please inform the leader of the existence of or changes in any physical, mental, emotional, or behavioral conditions and maintenance medications that may affect the youth. Please note all such conditions (example: allergies, cerebral palsy, visual impairment, attention deficit syndrome, etc.) and medications on the registration and Health/emergency forms. **THANK YOU!**

In the event of an emergency, I give permission for the Plymouth County Conservation staff or volunteers to administer first aid and/or obtain emergency medical treatment for me/my child. I understand that every effort will be made to contact me and/or my emergency listing. I understand that if necessary, I/ this participant will be transported by ambulance to the nearest hospital. I agree that any cost incurred for any transportation and/or treatment will be my responsibility.

September 13 Sunset on the Bluff 6-8pm

Years Day. Reservations can be made for private groups beginning November 1st. Private groups can rent the hill during the week for a two hour time frame, throughout the tubing season.


